ADAPTIVE THINKING AND ADAPTIVE LEADERSHIP

"People do not fear change...people fear loss." (Ron Heifetz)

Ron Heifetz describes adaptive leadership in this way: adaptive leadership [and adaptive thinking] is the activity of mobilizing people to tackle tough challenges and thrive. The concept of *thriving* is drawn from evolutionary biology. We learn that effective adaptation has three characteristics. First, it preserves the DNA essential for the species' continued survival [replace species with church]. Second, it re-regulates or rearranges the DNA to serve the species' [church's] current needs. And, third, it creates DNA arrangements that give the species the ability to flourish in new ways and in more challenging environments. Successful

adaptations enable a living system to take the best from its history into the future.

He continues by saying that adaptive leadership is about change that enables the capacity to thrive. New environments, new challenges, and even new dreams demand new strategies and abilities, as well as the leadership to mobilize them. These new combinations and variations help [churches] thrive under challenging circumstances rather than perish or regress. Leadership, then, must wrestle with questions of value, purpose and process (similar to Simon Sineks' three questions of why, how and what).

Adaptive leadership is successful when it is able to engage people in distinguishing what is essential to preserve from what can be re-regulated and rearranged. Such adaptations are both conservative and progressive. They make the best possible use of previous wisdom and know-how. Such leadership anchors change in the values of the organization. Such leadership also sees and understands the need to adapt.

This is why we often "feel" afraid when we just hear the word *change*, when we are involved in any conversations about change, or when we are asked to consider questions about changing something. Our fear emotions cause us to turn inward and hold on to what was rather than look up and let go in order to even give thought to something different. Leadership on adaptive challenges is about loss. Learning is often painful. Adapting can be painful. One person's new idea can cause another to feel afraid or irrelevant. Not many people like to be "rearranged."


This is why people do not fear change, people fear loss. Adapting involves change. And we're afraid of change because with it comes loss. Sometimes the loss is emotional, as we remember "the good old days" or how things used to be when those things were effective. Those days really are gone, so what "good days" do we want to experience now? How do we have to adapt for that experience to be a possibility? Yes...good days are ahead. If we adapt.

Sometimes the loss is personal, because people who were with us in the past are no longer here. For diverse reasons. Many people are not able now to do what they did a few years ago. For diverse reasons. And, there is a sense of loss when we face the truth that what worked in the past simply will not work today. At least not in a way that will enable our church to thrive. So, we must adapt our thinking and adapt how we are being church and doing church.

In so many areas of our church, we continue to face challenges. Challenges that require us to be open to adapting. Heifetz is helpful to me because his insights acknowledge that adapting (changing) is always anchored in our values. This is why in August and September we've focused in worship on our values and God's mission for our church. When we are clear about our essential DNA, we can more clearly see how to honor who we have been, how to use our essential DNA as ground in which to plant new ideas that will enable us to grow toward who God is calling us to be and what God is calling us to do.

Thank you for your faithfulness to our church. And your willingness to ask some tough questions, engage in some challenging conversations, and make some difficult decisions.



Personnel Committee Two years ago, all CBC members were asked to participate in a survey that would provide direction for our future. 
